CONTINUUM OF CARE

- A Continuum of Care (CoC) is the group of stakeholders that carry out homeless service responsibilities for a defined geographic area. ES CoC is Inyo, Mono, and Alpine Counties.
- Composed of representatives of organizations including: nonprofit homeless providers, victim service providers, faith-based organizations, governments, businesses, advocates, public housing agencies, school districts, social service providers, mental health agencies, hospitals, universities, affordable housing developers, law enforcement, organizations that serve homeless and formerly homeless veterans, and homeless and formerly homeless persons.
- Responsibilities of a CoC include operating the CoC, designating and operating an HMIS, planning for the CoC, and designing and implementing the process associated with applying for CoC Program funds.
- 400 CoCs in US and 44 in California.

EASTERN SIERRA CoC

- Needs assessment by IMACA identified unserved homeless population in community.
- CoC established in 2013 to address shelter and housing needs.
- Membership includes representatives from counties, nonprofits, faith-based organizations, and advocates. Seeking person with lived experience to inform stakeholders.
- Funding received from federal and state competitive and non-competitive grants.
- IMACA is the CoC Administrative Entity and Collaborative Applicant.
- Quarterly & Special Meetings; Count and Coordinate Entry Subcommittees

CoC GUIDING PRINCIPALS

- Housing Focused.
- Housing First compliant.
- Informed by people with lived experience.
- Racial equity.
- Strategic use of funds.
- Unified regional response.

HOMELESSNESS IN THE EASTERN SIERRA


- 2018 Point-in-Time Count of people experiencing homelessness - 157

- 2020 -184 (-14%)
- CoC currently planning 2021 Count.
