### Recommendation

### **Background**

During the September IMBC Advisory Council Meeting it was decided that formal presentations should be made to the complete elected Boards/Councils for Inyo County, Mono County, the City of Bishop, and Town of Mammoth Lakes.

Further discussion ensued at the October meeting regarding the rough content which should be included in the presentations. Based on this feedback, Jessica Kennedy developed a rough slide deck consisting of basic information about the Consortium and our key work initiatives. Additionally, it was determined that these presentations should be expanded to include several of the Tribal Councils, and perhaps other NGO type organizations such as Chambers of Commerce, Lyons and Rotary Clubs, etc.

# California Advanced Services Fund (CASF)

CASF Accounts and Status as of March 1, 2018

- 1. The **Broadband Infrastructure Grant Account:** Authorized \$570 million<sup>1</sup> to fund capital costs of broadband infrastructure projects in unserved areas.
  - Since inception, 62 projects approved with total grant awards of \$229,305,391
  - 1A) Line Extension: \$5 million from the Infrastructure Grant Account to fund grants to individual households or property owners to offset the costs of connecting to an existing or proposed facility-based broadband provider.
- 2. The Broadband Infrastructure Revolving Loan Account: Will not issue any new loans.
- 3. The Rural and Urban Regional Broadband Consortia Grant Account: Authorized \$25 million to facilitate the deployment of broadband infrastructure by assisting infrastructure grant applicants in the project development or grant application process.
  - Since inception, 34 consortia groups with total awards of \$13,484,590<sup>2</sup>
- 4. The **Broadband Public Housing Account:** Authorized \$25 million to provide grants dedicated to broadband access and adoption in publicly supported housing communities.
  - Since inception, 431 projects approved (342 infrastructure + 89 adoption) with total awards of \$12,586,477
- 5. The **Broadband Adoption Account:** Authorized \$20 million to provide grants to increase publicly available or after-school broadband access and digital inclusion.
  - First application window is July 1, 2018

#### **Definitions**

- Connect America Fund (CAF II)-a Federal Communications Commission (FCC) funded program which expands availability of broadband infrastructure to areas lacking access to speeds of 10 mbps downstream and 1 mbps upstream.
- **Unserved household**-a household for which no facility-based broadband provider offers broadband service at speeds of at least 6 mbps downstream and 1 mbps upstream
- Right-Of-First-Refusal (ROFR)-Annually, existing facility-based broadband providers have the opportunity to demonstrate that they will deploy broadband or upgrade existing facilities to a delineated unserved area within 180 days of submitting its right of first refusal demonstration letter.
- Eligible Project-a project that identifies an area with the following conditions:
  - 1) Must contain unserved households
  - 2) Must not be within a ROFR area
  - 3) Must not be within an existing CASF project area
  - 4) Must not be in a CAF II area, except that an existing facility-based broadband provider in the CAF II designated area may apply to provide service to households that would not otherwise receive service from the CAF II upgrade

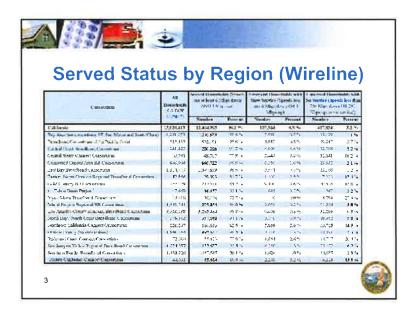


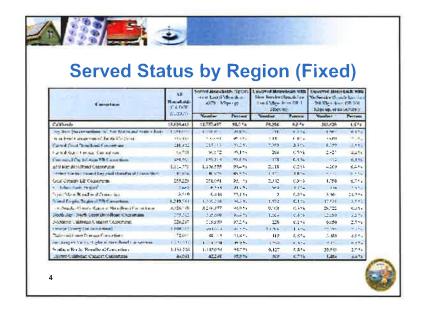


# **AB 1665 Changes**

# State of NE Consortium

- 82.5% (wireline) 97.2% (fixed) HHs served
- Mostly low-density communities left many in unincorporated areas
- Planned builds to over 8K unserved HHs
  - 6K CAF accepted locations; 1,345 HHs in unserved blocks
  - 45 HHs in ROFR blocks
  - 111 HHs from Charter buildout in Alturas
  - Frontier required to offer 10/1 to 7,000 unserved HHs (D. 15-12-005)



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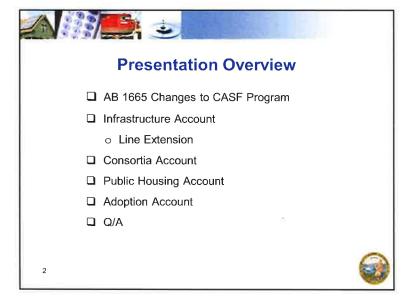

  - Phase I: Broadband Adoption, Public Housing and Loan Accounts (Comments due March 16; Reply Comments due April 2)
  - Phase II: Infrastructure, Line Extension and Consortia Accounts (Comments due April 16; Reply Comments due May 1)



# INFRASTRUCTURE GRANT ACCOUNT









# **AB 1665 Implementation Requirements**

- 98% Infrastructure availability goal by consortia region.
- Projects that only deploy middle-mile infrastructure are not eligible for grant funding.
- Eligible Projects
  - o An area containing unserved households and that is not within a CAF II, ROFR, or existing CASF project area.
  - o CAF II areas remain project eligible to a corresponding existing facilities based provider to extend service within its CAF II area.
  - o Capable of offering at or above 10/1 Mbps, irrespective of the project's technology.





# **Staff Infrastructure Proposal**

- Prioritize areas for grants (e.g. low-income areas, unserved households with no service).
  - o Set-Aside: A minimum of \$100M to benefit low-income communities through all forms of applications.
- Improve and streamline application review process.
  - o Expedited Ministerial Review for low-income communities and low cost projects.
  - o Request for Proposal Ministerial Review for high-priority areas.
  - o Remove bond requirement.
- Establish Submission and Selection Timelines
  - o Annual submission of CASF grant applications due three months after publication of the annual ROFR determinations (on the Interactive Broadband Map)





# LINE EXTENSION PROGRAM (LEP)



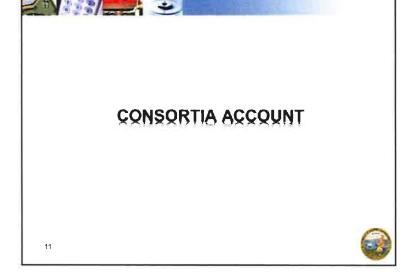


## **AB 1665 Implementation Requirements**

- The LEP provides grants to individual households or property owners to offset the costs of connecting to an existing or proposed facility-based broadband provider.
- Any infrastructure built with LEP funds shall become property of, and part of, the network of the provider.
- The Commission is required to consider limiting funds to households based on income, and to limit grants on a perhousehold basis.
- The grantee is required to pay for a percentage of the project.

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# **Staff LEP Proposal**

- Limit grants to qualifying low-income applicants except when the properties are used for designated activities, such as farming or education.
- Provide a high level (95%) of subsidy for low-income applicants.
- Limit line extension to unserved households; it can be overhead, underground or wireless.
- Applicant secures a proposed contract.
- An expedited review process will be available to projects that meet certain conditions.
- Reporting and payment are provided when the project is complete; payment is made to the provider.
- The proposed project needs to be completed in one year.





# **AB 1665 Implementation Requirements**

- Changes consortia eligibility and requires that monies are available for assisting infrastructure applicants in the project development or grant process.
- Requires each consortium conduct an annual audit of its expenditures and submit to the Commission an annual report.





# **Staff Consortia Proposal**

- Acceptable Activities Public engagement and identifying priority areas and cost-effective strategies; identifying potential CASF infrastructure projects/opportunities; assisting infrastructure development and applications.
- Eligibility Allow both existing and newly formed consortia to submit applications.
  - o One consortium per geographic region.
- Performance metrics Action and Work Plans
- Submission and Timelines TBD for new consortia
- Reporting/Progress reports bi-annual vs. quarterly reporting

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# **AB 1665 Implementation Requirement**

 After all existing funds available in the Public Housing Account are awarded, a publicly supported community can apply for funding from the Infrastructure and/or Adoption Account.

### **Staff Public Housing Proposal**

- · Reduce reporting requirement.
- Coordinate schedule for reporting and payment.
- Provide 'Ramp-up' period for digital literacy projects to be within six months.
- Application window is set for two times a year instead of four times a year, in coordination with the Adoption Account.





# **AB 1665 Implementation Requirement**

- Increase publicly available or after-school broadband access and digital inclusion.
- Monies in this account shall not be used to subsidize the costs of providing broadband service to households.
- Give preference to programs in communities with demonstrated low broadband access.
- Eligible applicants—local governments, senior centers, schools, public libraries, nonprofit organizations, and community-based organizations with programs to increase publicly available or after school broadband access and digital inclusion.
- The Commission shall be ready to accept applications no later than July 1, 2018

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# **Staff Adoption Proposal**

- Digital Literacy Project fund up to 85% of the costs
- Digital inclusion such as digital literacy training programs and public education.
- Broadband Access Project fund up to 85% of the costs
  - Free broadband access in community training rooms or other public space.
  - Community outreach, such as analysis and comparison of Internet plans.
- Submission and Timelines
- o July 1, 2018 and semi-annually until all funds are awarded
- Review Criteria
- Expedited review criteria include funding request of \$50,000 or less.
- Resolution review requests that do not meet the expedited review criteria.
